Basic Grammar, Vocabulary and Sentence Structure

Performance Criteria:

- Show awareness of meaning in sentences
- Able to re-arrange words to form meaningful sentences

Purpose of Activity:

To develop students' reading skills in Arabic by identifying and understanding interrogative sentences structure through spoken instructions, repetition and re-arrange words tasks.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the lesson, students should be able to:

- Recognise and repeat familiar interrogative articles:
- Listen and repeat Arabic interrogative sentences
- Fill in the blanks by appropriate interrogative articles
- Re-arrange words to for meaningful interrogative sentences
- Show understanding of verb-subject agreement in questions and answers

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Teaching trajectories/ Implementation guidelines:

Activity 1:

Read and repeat

- 1. Read interrogative sentences with their respective answers aloud
- 2. Ask students to repeat the sentences orally
- 3. Discuss the meaning of sentences by referring to lesson 1
- 4. Highlight the change in verb agreement from third person to first person in answers

Activity 2:

Fill in the blanks

- 1. Read sentences aloud and ask students to repeat
- 2. Request students to recall meaning of words and interrogative articles given
- 3. Ask students to fill in the blanks with correct interrogative articles

Activity 3:

Re-arrange words to form meaningful sentences

- 1. Read the given words aloud and ask students to repeat
- 2. Students discuss the meaning of every words by referring to previous activities
- 3. Highlight the verb-subject agreement in the third person feminine pronoun
- 4. Students re-arrange given words forming meaningful sentences
